# 2.1 Trade Across Continents



**Main Idea** European exploration of the Americas led to new trade routes among the world's continents.

Shortly after Columbus landed in the Caribbean in 1492, the Spanish began to make use of the region's rich resources. Their actions were the first steps toward global trade.


## **Farming for Profit**


Spanish settlers in the Caribbean grew cash crops, or crops for profit. Land on the islands was well suited for growing certain raw materials that were in short supply in Europe. For example, sugarcane grew well on the islands, and could be sold in Europe where there was a scarcity, or shortage. Spanish settlers exploited, or took advantage of, the labor of the native people for the heavy work on their farms.

The native people were also weakened by sickness. They could not fight the diseases, like smallpox and malaria, that settlers brought with them from Europe. As large numbers of native people died from disease, Spanish settlers had to look elsewhere for the workers they needed to farm their cash crops. So, after minerals and raw materials arrived in Spain, manufactured goods went to Africa to pay for slaves, beginning more than 300 years of slavery in the Americas.

## New Trade Changes the World

Beginning in the 1500s, goods were exchanged in what became known as **triangular trade**—trade among three continents: the Americas, Europe, and Africa. The new trade established economic patterns that continue today.





Triangular trade soon brought about competition among European countries for the resources of the region. Spain was gaining great wealth from its settlements in the Americas, causing other European countries to join the race for profit. Portugal, France, and Britain began competing with Spain for control over trade and colonization of the Americas.
